This game merges physical activity with language learning to boost memory retention and make learning more interactive. After all, studies show that moving while learning helps activate different parts of your brain, improving recall and retention.

As you progress, challenge yourself by using less common verbs or creating short sentences with the verbs in your target language.

Difficulty Level: Easy

Objective: Reinforce vocabulary and improve recall by rapidly generating and acting out verbs in your target language.

Materials & Preparation:

- None required (just yourself and some space!)
- Optionally, you can use **Lingopie** to review verbs from scenes before playing. Watch a short scene to identify new verbs, then apply them in this game.

- 1. Stand up in an open space.
- 2. Think of a verb in your target language starting with 'A'. If you're using Lingopie, try to recall a verb from a recent show or movie you've watched. For example, if learning Spanish, you might choose the verb "andar" (to walk).

Materials & Preparation:

- A timer or stopwatch

- Optional: Lingopie subscription to explore vocabulary from your favorite shows

- 1. Write the word FACTS vertically down your page. Each letter represents a different category:
 - F: Food
 - A: Animals
 - C: Clothing
 - T: Tools (can also include household items, objects)
 - S: Spaces (places like rooms, buildings, locations)
- 2. Set the timer for 3 minutes. During this time, your goal is to generate as many words as possible in each category, writing them under the appropriate letter.

- Make the game more challenging by narrowing the categories. For example, for Food, focus on fruits or beverages, or for Tools, only list items used for cooking.

Difficulty Level: Medium

Objective: Improve spelling, vocabulary, and listening skills by reconstructing and analyzing subtitles from Lingopie shows.

Materials & Preparation:

Mechanics:

Up for a challenge?

After reconstructing the dialogue, try to rewrite it again using synonyms for key words, challenging yourself to express the same ideas in a slightly different way. For example, replace verbs or adjectives with ones that are slightly more advanced.

As you work through scenes, keep a running list of new words or phrases in your notebook. Over time, you can review these words and use them in future rounds of **Lingopie Scene Spotter** or other language games like **I've Got FACTS**.

- 1. Select a simple, everyday word in your target language. For example, an adjective like "good" or a verb like "walk."
- 2. At the top of your sheet, write down the word you've chosen. This will be the foundation of your pyramid.

- 3. Directly below the base word, write two synonyms that are slightly more specific or intense versions of the word. For example, if your word is "bueno" in Spanish, you might write "excelente" or "genial" below that.

4. If you're a beginner, focus on just two or three rows of synonyms to keep it manageable. You can always expand the pyramid later as your vocabulary grows.

Learning tip: After building your pyramid, challenge yourself by writing sentences using each word. Make sure the context fits the intensity or specificity of the word.

For example:

- "La comida es buena." (The food is good.)
- "La comida fue excelente." (The food was excellent.)
- "La comida fue espléndida." (The food was splendid.)

If you're just starting out, don't worry about completing the pyramid all at once. You can gradually fill it in over a few days or even a week as you come across new words in your learning journey.

Word Chain Challenge

This game pushes your vocabulary recall and quick-thinking skills to the limit. By creating a continuous chain of words where each word starts with the last letter of the previous one, you strengthen your ability to make rapid connections between words in your target language.

Difficulty Level: Hard

Objective: Improve vocabulary recall and spelling by creating a chain of words where each new word starts with the last letter of the previous word.

Materials & Preparation:

A sheet of paper

- A pen or pencil
- A timer or stopwatch

Category Crossover

Category Crossover is a fun and challenging way to deepen your understanding of how words work in multiple contexts. The game encourages flexible thinking and helps you build a more versatile vocabulary.

If you're just starting out, feel free to use simpler categories and work your way up. More advanced learners can take it to the next level with more abstract themes.

Difficulty Level: Hard

Objective: Expand your vocabulary by identifying words that can fit into multiple categories, deepening your understanding of their versatility in your target language.

Materials & Preparation:

A large sheet of paper

- Colored pens or pencils
- Lingopie subscription for discovering new words

Mechanics:

- On your paper, draw three overlapping circles to create a Venn diagram.
 This diagram will help you visually organize words that fit into multiple categories.
- 2. Select three different categories for the circles. For example, you might choose **Food**, **Colors**, and **Feelings**.

Want to make it extra heart-pounding? Use a timer to add urgency! Each player should only have 30 seconds to draw or write their description before passing it on. This forces quick thinking and creative use of vocabulary.

Chapter 2 Conversation Simulators

While building a strong vocabulary is the foundation of language learning, being able to use that vocabulary in real-life conversations is the ultimate goal.

In our experience, conversation practice is where your vocabulary really starts to come alive. It pushes you to think on your feet, choose the right words, and form sentences that flow naturally. The more you simulate real conversations, the more your brain connects those words and phrases to everyday use.

But just like vocabulary, **mastering conversation isn't about memorization—it's about interaction.** Whether you're talking to yourself, role-playing, or practicing dialogue, you're training your brain to recall vocabulary and use it flexibly in different contexts.

In this section, you'll find 4 conversation-focused games designed to improve your fluency, enhance your recall, and boost your confidence.

Hot Seat Interview

This game puts you in the spotlight, where you'll answer questions about yourself as if you were being interviewed by a famous magazine. It's a fun and simple way to practice speaking, using everyday vocabulary to talk about your life, preferences, and interests.

Remember, the goal is simply to respond confidently, as if you were a star in the making!

Difficulty Level: Easy to Advanced (adjustable based on the questions you choose)

Objective: Practice answering questions about yourself in your target language, while building fluency and confidence at any level.

Materials & Preparation:

- A timer (optional)
- A copy of basic interview-style questions
- Optional: Lingopie subscription to gather new vocabulary or see how native speakers introduce themselves in interviews

Objective: Improve conversational skills by responding to dialogue from Lingopie shows.

Mechanics:

Ready for a standing ovation? Play as the opposite character in your next round and see how well you can respond from a different perspective.
